NEWS FROM DENMAN ISLAND

Denman Festival News, and an idea for CVWS... by Stewart Goodings

I'd like to tell newsletter readers about an event which took place on Denman July 16/17—local DI writers and performers sharing their work to a *live audience* in the Community Hall!

We called it **Turning the Page** (on Covid, of course, though the recent increasing cases of the infection show we were a bit too hopeful that a page had been turned!). There was an eclectic mix of poetry including "I Will Be More Myself in the Next World", Matsuki Masutani's debut book of poetry published by Mother Tongue Press, several short stories, an excerpt from Des Kennedy's latest novel-in-the-works, "An Island Commune", guitar and piano magic by two local musicians, Kevin Mitchell and Bethany Ireland, and a surprise appearance by an early settler to Denman, William Baikie who died in 1941, but returned (courtesy of a certain Stewart Goodings, sporting a moustache, bowler hat, and cane, and an appropriate Scottish accent) to share his perceptions of how Denman had changed but still remained the same 'bonnie wee island' he remembered.

What struck me afterward was to wonder whether something similar could be put on by CVWS, either as part of the annual January conference, or at a separate time? The talent pool in our society is diverse and deep and a program could be organized to enable more of our local writers to present their work in a bigger venue than the small back room in the Courtenay public library. This would be a good way for new books to be given a boost by our members as well as to introduce aspiring writers to the broader community. For Denmanwas a bit of an experiment. Is this an initiative worth replicating for CVWS writers?

Review of the Denman Island Writing Week by Janet Miller

The Denman Island Writing Week was held online, by Zoom, from July 12-16 with 8 participants (4 from Vancouver Island and 4 from Ontario and Quebec).

The instructor, **Caroline Adderson**, started the mornings with craft lessons: Beginnings, Transitions, Writing Narrative Scenes and Character Motivation and Arc.

Each participant submitted up to 5000 words pieces and these were distributed to the group prior to the Writing Week. Caroline provided 'Critique Guidelines'. During the week each person had their work reviewed by the whole group and also had a one-on-one consultation with

Caroline. Our task on Friday, after working diligently on revision of a section of our work, paying attention to what we had learned and to suggestions that had been made, was to read aloud a 5-minute piece.

Caroline is an award-winning author of many kids books and novels and a great writing instructor.

Review of Wendy Wickwire's Workshop: Animating the Creative in Creative Nonfiction by Kim Letson

Wendy brought her experience as professor, author and historian to this workshop/discussion packed with useful tips for keeping readers engaged as they negotiate historic details.


Some takeaways ...

- 1. Massive information dumps overwhelm readers. Wendy has avoided this pitfall by providing smaller bites of historical data at each stop along a train journey.
- 2. Allowing the reader to learn as a character learns keeps the reader engaged.
- 3. Too much context and background information in the first paragraphs or chapter is a huge turn off.
- 4. The purpose of the piece/book is key. Academic writing has specific requirements while non-academic writing can use more creative dialogue and scene. Regardless, the writer's integrity requires remaining true to the facts and maintaining reasonable objectivity. (Recognizing that even objective writing has a subjective bias which needs to be acknowledged.)
- 5. Research provides masses of material. No need to share it all with the reader. Just pick the salient bits that matter for the particular story.

MY BOOK JOURNEY as an Independent Author/Publisher

When I started writing *Pomegranates at 4800*



Metres, I thought writing a book meant sit, write, publish. I had no trouble with sitting and writing. The rest not so much.

Floundering, I signed up for a CVWS workshop with an editor and had an ahha moment. The editor — Trevor McMonagle reviewed my work, made

numerous suggestions to improve my writing and helped me sort the stories into logically

sequenced chapters. I continue to work with Trevor, publishing *Soul of a*Nomad last year and currently in the final revision stages of *In the Footsteps of a Roman Legion*.

My sojourn into the world of book design was rocky. However, at another CVWS workshop I connected with one of the presenters – Greg Salisbury. Book designer, type setter extraordinaire, he sorted out the mess for a second printing of *Pomegranates*. He then worked countless extra hours on *Soul of a Nomad* because I'd used a free word processing program instead of Microsoft Word. The free program didn't' convert well into In-Design which is the industry standard for book layout.

I continue to work with Greg who also organizes my ISBNs and is my book distributor through Red Tuque Books.

I've used two printer/binders, both of whom provided excellent service and well-bound books. I started with First Choice Books but switched to Island Blue when I started working with Greg because of his connection with them. Island Blue is lined up to print my third book this November. As an independent author, I publish under West Moon Publishing. A hopeless marketer, I'm about to contact Vancouver based The Self-Publishing Agency, for assistance in that department.

This journey has taught me that writing books is the easy part and working with a supportive team of professionals is a vital component in book production.


